- Play or run in the class
- Run in the corridors
- Be late in reporting to class
- Be late in submission of work
- Bunk classes
- Bring Mobiles, Firecrackers, Colours, Valuables and heavy cash to the school
- Litter in class or school
- · Eat during teaching periods
- · Chew gum in the school
- Use unfair means during examinations
- Carry or wear accessories to school
- Bring any electronic device/items to the school





Parents and guardians must read and explain the school rules to their wards.

- Any communication made by the parent/guardian should be addressed to the Principal.
 The application should mention the child's name, address, phone number, admission number, class, and section.
- Parents are requested to refrain from entering the classrooms or making telephone calls to contact or to see their children/teachers during school hours.
- Any change in the Residential Address, Telephone Number or other vital information should be promptly intimated in writing to the school.
- Parents must ensure that they send their children with appropriate lunches. Due to security and safety concerns, requests to bring the lunch box to school later will not be entertained.
- Parents' attention is drawn to criticism of the school or teachers in the presence of a child, which should be carefully avoided because it causes the students to lose respect for the teachers and, consequently, fail to learn from them. It also retards their progress.
- If the parents have a legitimate complaint, they must meet the Principal as soon as possible. The principal will personally verify the complaint.
- 7. Parents are required to cooperate with the school in its attempt to help their children progress by paying attention to their regularity, punctuality and discipline and taking a keen interest in their work. (They should check the Almanac every day and note the homework and other instructions given. They are advised to check the bags of their wards to see if any circular/notice/invitation has been issued.)
- Care must be taken of the school and its property, and if any damage is done, the student(s) concerned must make good the damage, and a fine must be imposed for the damage.
- Students are not allowed to wear earrings/nose rings. Girls are allowed to wear only small tops/studs(pins). Girls from Class III onwards must tie two hair plaits daily. No student is allowed to wear nail polish/mehendi/tattoos under any circumstance in the name of marriage, Rakhi, etc.
- Students cannot bring valuable articles to school, such as expensive watches, fountain pens, transistors, cameras, calculators, or jewellery.
- All students are expected to join the school on the notified date at the beginning of the term and after each vacation.
- 12. If parents or guardians fail to meet the school authorities when advised, their ward may not be allowed to attend classes until the meeting occurs.
- Parents should refrain from contacting the teachers over the phone, but they can meet them by prior appointment.



14. Parents and guardians will appreciate that the student's absence during the term is not in the student's best interest. Parents are asked not to apply for leave if it is avoidable.

Leaves can be granted to the students only on the following grounds:

- In case of severe illness or death of a very near relative.
- For a condolence visit, if the student is the only male family member, where custom so demands.
- To attend the marriage of his / her brother, sister, uncle or aunt.
- 15. Parents must check the school calendar, date sheets, and other circulars before making phone enquiries.
- 16. Students cannot bring sweets, presents, etc., to school to mark their/another's birthday or any other occasion.
- 17. Parents are requested to refrain from entering the school buses to see off and receive their wards.
- 18. Parents should not try to overtake and stop the school bus to facilitate their children's boarding, as this endangers their safety.
- Parents should not argue with the bus teachers or the conductor/driver. If there is any problem, a written complaint should be submitted to the Principal.
- Parents are requested not to send any non-vegetarian food, including egg preparations, to school. Only
 nutritious and healthy vegetarian food should be packed in the tiffin boxes.
- 21. Parents are advised to regularly check their child's haircut, nails, uniform, and punctuality.
- Parents are encouraged to have their children converse in English and their native language at home. This is crucial for enhancing their conversational skills and fostering a conducive atmosphere at school.
- Students should observe polite manners wherever they go. They should never forget that their conduct judges
 the school.
- 24. The student's Name, Class, & Section should be marked on all belongings, including the Blazer, etc.

PUBLIC

Parents and guardians must read and explain the school rules to their wards.

MEDIUM OF INTERACTION

All the students are expected to talk to their teachers and friends in English during school hours. This habit will help them enrich their standard of English and also to understand the lessons well. Politeness and good manners are expected to be used while interacting with fellow students, staff, parents and visitors. English is our in-campus language.

- Every student should carry their Almanac to School every day.
- Parents are requested to use the school bus facility to commute their wards to the school. Non-bus commuters should arrive at School 10 minutes before the start of the Home Room Period.
- In the morning, the warning bell will ring 5 minutes before the start of the Home Room Period, which is the signal
 for all students to go to their respective classrooms. It should be done promptly and in silence. As soon as they are
 in their classes, students must prepare for the assembly/period.
- 4. Change of classrooms between periods should be done in silence and in orderly manner.
- Non-Sikh boys should get their hair cut at regular intervals. The cut should be a simple boy's cut. Girls with long hair must tie it neatly into plaits with a hair band.
- No shouting or whistling is allowed in or around the school premises. Running in the corridors is strictly prohibited.
- Throwing any object(s) at anyone is strictly forbidden.
- No child should damage/spoil the school or other children's property. Any such damage shall be made good by the parents. Intentional damage may lead to termination.
- Any damage done will be made good by the student concerned, together with a heavy fine imposed on them for such an offence. Anyone who notices something damaged should report the matter, even if they do not know who has done it.
- 10. Students cannot bring sharp instruments or valuables to the school.
- Books (besides textbooks or library books), magazines or paper may only be brought to the school with the Class Teacher's permission.
- 12. Lending or borrowing of money or other articles is not permitted.
- 13. Students who come to school in the care of attendants should always stay on the premises before the attendant arrives. In case of delay, they should report to the school office. Those who go home alone should remain calm on the way but be prompted to return home after school. Students are warned not to buy or receive anything from anyone on the way home or to school.
- 14. They should greet their teachers whenever and wherever they meet them.
- The School reserves the right to terminate the students with unsatisfactory progress in studies or whose conduct is a bad influence on others.
- Exploding crackers or splashing colours during Diwali / Holi or any other occasion on the school premises or buses is strictly forbidden. Non-compliance with these instructions can result in strict actions/expulsion from the school.
- 17. Students should attend the festivals and functions celebrated in the school.
- Students cannot carry mobile phones, electronic gadgets, or any banned items/contraband to school. Stern action (that might lead to expulsion) will be taken against students violating this rule.
- Students must come to school in proper uniform only. This rule applies even when they come to school for any purpose other than attending classes or after school hours.
- 20. Wearing low-waist trousers is not allowed.
- If any child does not come in proper uniform, they will be sent back home (with parents) after the third warning, for which parents will receive a call from the school to pick up their ward, and the child will be marked absent for the day.
- 22. Open Day and PTM dates will be communicated through prior notice / SMS/Mail.
- 23. The School will not receive any tiffin or lunch box during school hours for safety reasons.





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- A student who has been absent the previous day will not be allowed to attend the class unless their parent(s)
 has/have entered an explanation stating the reason for the absence in the Record of Non-Attendance
 section of the Almanac for each day (Application valid for two days) the student has been absent from school.
 If a child reports to school without an explanation in the Almanac, the parents will be called to the school, and
 the child will be sent back home.
- In case of absence for more than two days on medical grounds, a Medical Certificate and prescription (photocopies) should be attached with the application.
- There is no provision for half-day leave. Therefore, students who are not well should not be sent to school
 even during assessments. The child will be marked absent if taken home by parent(s)/guardian(s)/authorised
 person during school hours, even if it was an assessment day. The child will not be awarded a grade for the
 assessment on that particular day.
- A student returning to school after suffering from an infectious or contagious disease should produce a
 doctor's fitness certificate, permitting them to attend school. Students suffering from the following diseases
 must observe the prescribed quarantine period before returning to school.

- Students who require medical attention during school hours may be sent to the school Infirmary by the teacher concerned, who will enter the nature of the complaint and sign the School Clinic Record' section of the Almanac.
- Students should only, in emergencies, visit the School Infirmary if an entry has been made in the Almanac by a teacher.
- Parents will be promptly informed in the event of serious illness/emergency and may be requested to come to school to take their child home, if necessary.
- Repeated absence without notice or unexplained absence without written application for more than six
 consecutive days, renders the student liable to have their name struck off the rolls. Re-admission may only be
 granted after the payment of the re-admission fee.

LATE ARRIVAL IN SCHOOL

- Students are expected to reach School 5 minutes before the Home Room Period starts. Students
 arriving late will only be allowed to enter the school premises with a plausible explanation.
- Arriving late at school is not acceptable. Students who have come late more than once in a term/semester will not be allowed to attend classes on the second such occurrence, and disciplinary action shall be taken against them.

ADMISSION/WITHDRAWAL/TERMINATION/EXPULSION

Admission:

- A child seeking admission to the school must first register their name on the school website and submit the forms to the school office.
- 2. Admission to School is considered based on age, merit and vacancy.
- The School reserves the right to grant admission to a student.
- If later, at any stage, it is found that the information provided to the school needs to be corrected, the admission will be cancelled.

Withdrawal:

- 1. One clear calendar months' notice in writing or a month's fee instead of notice must be given before the pupil is withdrawn.
- 2. Those who leave school during the session must, in all cases, pay the fees for the month last attended.
- 3. ATransfer Certificate is issued once all the school dues are settled/cleared.
- 4. Students can be asked to leave the school on the following grounds:
 - Disciplinary
 - Unsatisfactory progress in studies.
 - Detention / repeated detentions in a class.
- The School espouses politeness in talk and behaviour as a particular aspect of education. Any rude/impolite behaviour towards staff members in/outside the school by any student/parent/guardian shall be sufficient reason for the immediate expulsion of the student from the school rolls.

T.C./Other Certified copies:

A T. C. is issued on payment of Rs. 500/-. A duplicate copy of T. C. is not ordinarily issued. In exceptional cases, the certificate can be issued after verification and only on payment of Rs. 700/- as a Duplicate Certificate Fee.

NOTE: Application forms for transfer certificates, address changes, duplicate ID cards, transport changes, and bonafide student/fee certificates are available on the school website. The required forms should be downloaded, filled out, and submitted to the school office.

HOUSE UNIFORM

House T-shirts and Track Pants are mandatory for boys and girls in all classes.

For all children, boys and girls alike, black shoes are the proper footwear for summer and winter. No shoes of any other colour or kind, chappals or high-heeled sandals, are permissible.

As long as students are on the school roll, they must always come to school in uniform and during the different practice sessions and extra classes.

No student is allowed to attend report reading/any school function in or outside the school in any dress other than the school uniform.

The napkin and mat are integral to the school uniform, so the students must carry these things to school daily.

The schedule of the house is as follows:

- I. Cyan Blue T-shirt with Track pant every Wednesday.
- 2. House Uniform every Friday.



Students can use school transport, subject to seat availability. The routes of the school buses are drawn up, and the parents should consult the school transport person in charge for necessary details. The school reserves the right to provide bus facilities to the students.

BUS RULES:

- Students using the school bus are expected to arrive at the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus arrives.
 The student must be on the correct side of the arriving bus.
- Students can use only the allotted bus and bus stop. With the school's prior written permission, all changes can be allowed.
- The buses will immediately respond to latecomers. Students who miss their allotted bus should not try to board any other bus. The parent is responsible for dropping their ward at the school gate. However, the student will return by the allotted bus.
- 4. The students should stay away from the main road until the bus arrives. They should only approach the bus's entry door once it has come to a complete halt. The front door of the bus is the only authorised entrance and exit
- Boarding and alighting from the buses should be done silently and orderly.
- All students must occupy vacant seats immediately after boarding their respective buses. Seat reservations for co-commuters are not allowed under any circumstance.
- Students should only travel on the footboard.
- 8. Students must not move around in the bus when it is in motion.
- The students must ensure they clear the bus aisle and correctly place school bags and other belongings.
- 10. Students must be seated on the bus and should not lift their hands out of the windows.
- No object should be discarded inside or thrown outside the bus.
- 12. Consumption of eatables is not permitted in the buses.
- Unruly behaviour like shrieking, shouting and playing mischief is strictly prohibited. Courteous behaviour is expected at all times.
- 14. The driver's attention must not be distracted for any reason.
- 15. If, due to particular difficulty, a student has to leave the school campus during school hours by his transport, the following rules have to be observed:
 - to give a written application
 - to take a Permission Slip from reception, duly endorsed, which must be shown at the school gate before leaving the campus.
- 16. Under no circumstance are students allowed to go behind or under the parked buses on the school campus. Students are also prohibited from sitting in the parked buses during school hours. They should not touch the instrument panel of the buses.
- 17. Any misbehaviour with the driver, conductor, fellow students or teachers in the bus by a child or a parent will not be tolerated. In such cases, the school reserves the right to cancel the transport facility for the child.
- 18. The drivers are authorised to stop buses only at the designated stops unless otherwise directed by the teacher(s) on the bus. The list of stops is prepared to keep the convenience and safety of all bus commuters in view and is subject to change as per requirement.
- 19. Senior boys cannot sit in back/behind bus seats.





- Parents are advised that if they have any issue related to school transportation, they should contact the school
 using the following contact numbers: 8969814400 and 7091497390. They should avoid discussing or arguing
 with Bus Drivers, Conductors or Transport-in-Charge.
- The students are responsible for maintaining discipline on the bus. Any severe offence must be reported to the Principal immediately.
- In case of a change in stop or bus (of a temporary or permanent nature), permission for the same has to be sought through a written application.
- 23. Parents must ensure their wards do not go, to or from the bus stops, unescorted.
- Parents / Guardians of such students who do not avail of the School Transport should report at the School gate 15
 minutes before dispersal to collect their wards.
- 25. No efforts for the safety of the students are spared, but the school will not be held responsible for any road accident in which the buses may unfortunately be involved.
- Transport charges are to be paid for the complete academic session (April-March). No request to discontinue the bus facility during the academic year will be entertained.
- The withdrawal of the Transport Facility is not allowed in the last quarter(Jan-March) of the academic year.
- 28. The School should be updated in case the student's address changes, to update the bus route.
- 29. The Bus Numbers allotted can only be changed with the permission of the school authorities.
- 30. The parents need permission from the school to take the student/ward with them on any particular day they want to take their ward(s) with them.

GUIDELINES FOR THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS USING PRIVATE MODES OF TRANSPORT

- All the parents will submit an undertaking if they decide to use private vans, taxis, autos, or cabs. This undertaking has to be renewed every year.
- The private vehicles should drop the students at either Gate No. 1 or Gate No. 3. After dropping the children, no driver should park their car around the school area. They should arrive 5 minutes before dispersal.
- If the driver is found to be violating the rules and directions, the parents will be asked to drop their children off personally, and the vehicle will be stopped.
- 4. During the dispersal, the children will board the private vehicles from Gate No. I or Gate No. 3. Parents should instruct the drivers to park their cars outside the gates and not be hurried. They should be counselled not to park their vehicles on the main road.
- A parent who agrees to pick up a student at their friend's request will have to submit a consent letter from their friend, a photocopy of their identity card, and an undertaking that they take responsibility for the child's safety and security.

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The school library is open to all students of Class II and above. Students visiting the library have to observe the following rules:

- 1. Every student shall borrow and read books from the library monthly as per the schedule.
- Students from Classes III[™] to XII [™] will be issued one book at a time for one week.
- 3. Students will only be eligible for a fresh issue if the previously issued book is returned.
- 4. If books are returned late without a valid reason, the borrowing facility will be withdrawn for up to one week.
- 5. Strict silence must be maintained in the library.
- 6. Reference books are not issued. These books can be consulted within the library premises only.
- The books that have been marked, disfigured or damaged will have to be replaced by the borrower, or a payment of 50 % over the cost price of the book is to be made.
- Any student found deliberately damaging or defacing a book may be debarred from the library for the entire term or academic year, and a fine will be levied.
- The library has an Open Access System, and the students must help to maintain the order and organisation of the collection on different shelves. They must place the books on the shelves strictly according to the subjects after consultation with the Library-in-Charge/Librarian.
- 10. The students are not allowed to bring their books or belongings to the library.
- The loss of a Library card shall be immediately reported in writing to the Librarian. A fine of Rs. 100/ will be charged for issuing a duplicate card.
- 12. The students shall not sub-lend the books issued from the library.
- 13. If the books are not returned on the due dates, an overdue charge of Rs 10/ per book per day will be charged.
- 14. We strongly advise parents to encourage their children to read books.

A qualified nurse looks after the well-stocked School Infirmary. Medical check-ups of students are regularly carried out, and the record of the same is maintained. The parents are informed if the nurse thinks a child needs special medical attention. It is noted that the school will not administer any medicine to a student other than first-aid. In severe cases, the student is carried to the nearby hospital and the parents are informed.

The parents are requested to impart Health Education to their children. It is essential that they follow the tips given below:

- Maintain personal hygiene, such as regularly trimming of nails and neatness.
- Exercise regularly.
- Sleep for at least eight hours daily.
- d) Have a balanced diet.
- e) Drink water that is either boiled or filtered. All students are advised to bring their water bottles from home.
- Avoid consumption of ice-creams, other milk products and eatables from roadside vendors and kiosks.
- g) All children should also be:
 - i) Dewormed at least twice yearly, on the family physician's advice.
 - Have a dental and ophthalmic check-up by a well-qualified dental surgeon and an ophthalmologist once every year.

It helps develop a sense of belonging among the students and provides them a platform to showcase their talents through a series of House Competitions organised by the school. These competitions are an excellent way for students to demonstrate their skills and abilities in various areas, including sports, academics, and the arts, and helps encourage healthy competition while promoting a positive school culture.

For the eligibility of any award, the child should have appeared for all the tests and examinations conducted by the school.



The school discipline system is based on the premise that actions have consequences. It endeavours to be consistent and fair and underpinned by natural justice principles. Clear boundaries must be established for the school community to operate as a safe learning environment where all strive for personal excellence. While rewards motivate the students to sustain good actions and consistently strive for better behaviour and efforts, reprimands are to check undesired actions on the part of the wrong-doer and deter other students from doing the same.

DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

The following disciplinary measures may be adopted by the school in dealing with students behaving in an unruly/inappropriate manner—

- Oral warning and counselling
- 2. Written warning
- 3. Detention during the break or for the whole day
- 4. Suspension (ranging from 7 days to 30 days)
- 5. Rustication

EXAMINATION AND PROMOTION POLICY FOR CLASSES III TO V

Jan Dhan Accounts – In a short period, we added 40 crore bank accounts ensuring financial inclusion, something that people expected would take years.

COVID Vaccines – With indigenous COVID-19 vaccines, the world's largest vaccination programme was delivered to 200 crore recipients flawlessly. India helped save millions of lives across the world through the Vaccine Maitri initiative, providing 23.5 crore COVID vaccines free of cost to 98 countries.

Chandrayaan – India's Mission to the Moon and becoming the first country to land on the South Pole of the moon, demonstrated our excellence in science, breaking boundaries in an economical way.

Climate Goals – India is the only country which has overachieved its Paris 2015 climate commitments 9 years ahead of time by meeting 40% of its power capacity from non-fossil fuels. This has raised our global standing.

Digital Public Infrastructure – The DPI we set up has been expanded at a blinding speed, allowing India to be a world leader in digitisation.

Infrastructure Expansion – The rapid expansion of state-of-the-art infrastructure is another example of improved capabilities. Railway track construction increased more than 3 times, the National Highways Network has increased by 60% and there has been 100% growth in Airports from 74 to 148.

India's Global Standing – The Presidency of the G20 saw the world respecting India's diplomatic and organisational capabilities. With India's global standing rising, international institutions like the International Solar Alliance are now being set up in India and international investors are coming to India in large numbers. In many ways, India is leading the world.
